Florida	Telehealth Practice Standards; Revises definition of term "telehealth." ( <a href="#">HB 79</a> )	Rep. Tom Fabricio (R)	Withdrawn prior to introduction. (1/18/2023)	Modifies telehealth practice standards and the definition of telehealth to allow audio-only phone calls as a permitted telehealth modality.
New Hampshire	Relative to prescribing opioids via telehealth medicine. ( <a href="#">HB 500</a> )	Rep. Mary Hakken-Phillips (D)	Referred to Health, Human Services and Elderly Affairs (1/11/2023)	Amends prescribing requirements for opioids and controlled substances. Edits the definition of telemedicine under the Nursing Practice Act. Allows practitioners of telehealth medicine to prescribe opioids. Sets out the process for prescribing schedules II-V through telemedicine.
Oregon	Relating to the practice of medicine via remote means; prescribing an effective date. ( <a href="#">SB 232</a> )	Request of Governor Katie Brown for Oregon Medical Board	Introduced (1/17/2023)	Allows out-of-state physician or physician assistant to provide specified care to patients located in Oregon. Clarifies that practice of medicine using telemedicine occurs where patient is physically located.
Texas	Relating to the provision of telehealth and telemedicine medical services by certain health professionals located outside of this state; requiring registration to engage in an occupation;	Rep. Matt Shaheen (R)	Filed (11/14/2022)	Expands the scope of what may be considered a doctor within the state to include physicians licensed by another state licensing board, parties authorized to assist doctors via telemedicine services, removes the "licensed in this state" component from a variety of licensing/practice requirements, and lays out the requirements for an out-of-state licensed doctor to practice in-state.

Virginia	State plan for medical assistance services; telemedicine, in-state presence. ( <a href="#">HB 1602/SB 1418</a> )	Del. Roxann Robinson (R) & Sen. Todd Pillion (R)	House Committee on Health, Welfare and Institutions (HB 1602) (1/6/2023) & Senate Committee on Education and Health (SB 1418) (1/11/2023)	Establishes that health care providers are not required to maintain a physical presence in the Commonwealth to maintain eligibility to enroll as a Medicaid provider. Additionally, the bill establishes that telemedicine services provider groups with health care providers duly licensed by the Commonwealth are not required to maintain an in-state service address to maintain eligibility to enroll as a Medicaid vendor or Medicaid provider group. Washington	Concerning telemedicine. ( <a href="#">HB 1027/SB 5036</a> )	Rep. Riccelli (D) & Sen. Muzzall (R)	Passed out House Committee on Health Care & Wellness, Referred to House Committee on Rules (HB 1027) (1/17/2023) & Passed out of Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care (SB 5036) (1/13/2023)	Extends the time frame until July 1, 2024 in which real-time telemedicine using both audio and video technology may be used to establish a relationship for the purpose of providing audio-only telemedicine for certain health care services. North Dakota	Relating to health insurance coverage of telehealth. ( <a href="#">SB 2160</a> )	Sen. Judy Lee (R)	Rereferred to Human Services (1/11/2023)	Amends the Insurance code definitions of store-and-forward technology and telehealth, removes other definitions for "E-visit," "nonpublic facing product," "virtual check-in" and "secure connection" and adds "telemonitoring services" to definitions. Telemonitoring services is not included in the definition of telehealth. Allows an insurer to establish criteria a health care provider is required to meet to demonstrate safety or efficacy of delivering a health care service through telehealth if the insurer does not already reimburse other health care providers for delivery of that health service through telehealth.
