Why It Matters

The Access to Prescription Digital Therapeutics Act (H.R. 3288 / S. 1702) is bipartisan legislation that would provide Medicare and Medicaid coverage for U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) cleared, software-based treatments—known as Prescription Digital Therapeutics (PDTs). These therapies are clinically validated, accessible through mobile devices, and address critical needs including mental and behavioral health, substance use disorders, and chronic disease management.

Key Benefits of Passing the PDT Act

- Bridges Access Gaps: Many Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries are currently excluded from accessing PDTs due to the lack of a benefit category.
- Aligns with FDA and CMS (Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services) Goals: PDTs undergo rigorous FDA review and are prescribed by providers—they should be treated like any other evidence-based treatment.
- Improves Outcomes & Lowers Barriers: PDTs enable on-demand access to care via mobile apps, helping patients overcome geographic, financial, and workforce shortages in healthcare.

Why Now

- Positive Global Data: Germany's Digital Health Applications (DiGA) program shows strong patient engagement and improved outcomes, demonstrating the real-world impact of digital therapeutics when supported by national policy.
- U.S. Economic Validation: The Peterson Health Technology Institute recently reviewed digital mental health treatments and found that existing Physician Fee Schedule codes provide a viable path for cost-effective reimbursement.
- Policy-Ready Infrastructure: The Prescription Digital Therapeutics Act is ready to move—the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) is positioned to score the bill, and CMS can act swiftly once enabled by statute.

Call to Action

We urge Congress to **support and pass H.R. 3288 / S. 1702** to:

- Establish clear Healthcare Common Procedure Coding System (HCPCS) coding and payment pathways for PDTs.
- Ensure Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries have access to innovative care.
- Create consistent national reimbursement standards for public and private payers.
